SPEEDING IN THE RESORT



PERCEPTION TIME, REACTION TIME, BRAKING TIME

Perception time is how long it takes to recognize a situation and understand that you need to stop. This can take about ¾ of a second. **Perception distance** is how far a vehicle travels during this time.

Reaction time is how long it takes to respond to a situation by moving your foot from the accelerator pedal to the brake pedal. The average reaction time is ¾ of a second. **Reaction distance** is how far a vehicle travels during this time.

Braking time is how long it takes a vehicle to stop after the brakes are applied. **Braking distance** is how far the vehicle travels during this time.

The faster a vehicle is moving the longer it takes you to stop. As we age our reaction time decreases, so from the time we realize we must stop until the time our vehicle actual comes to a stop, not only depends on the speed of the vehicle, but our own perception, reaction, and braking time(s).

For example, using the average reaction time of ¾ of a second, at 10 miles per hour, the distance you would travel before your vehicle would come to a stop is approximately 1 car length, if all conditions are perfect, and you are alert. Again, as your speed increases so does the distance it takes you to stop.

With all the activity in our resort (pedestrian, golf cart, bicycle traffic etc.) having a 10 mile per hour speed limit is not only **appropriate** but **imperative** for everyone's safety. Let's be the example!







*Please recycle your old magazines and books as we want to keep the collection as current as possible.


MISSING BOOKS
